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Family wants to use city lot for a garden

A Flushing family passionate about gardening and healthy eating is hoping to turn an unused city-owned lot into a community garden.

Alishia West, 31, an administrative assistant for LSL Construction; her husband, Zach Turk, 32, a horticultural therapist; and their daughter, Alyssa West, 12, who live on 164th Street between the Long Island Expressway and the Grand Central Parkway, shared their proposal at Community Board 7's monthly board meeting earlier this month.

The community garden would be in a lot owned by the city Department of Citywide Administrative Services on 63rd Road off 136th Street in

"The soil is good for growing," West said. "It's flat, it's a kind of quiet area. It's on a dead-end street. Nobody even knows it's there. It's prime real estate for this thing."

West is in contact with Administrative Services and the city Parks Department's GreenThumb, which provides programming and support to more than 600 community gar-

DOB halts illegal work at old house

Former judge's home torn down

formerly belonged to federal Judge Nicholas Garaufis has been nearly demolished in violation of the work permits issued by the city Department of Buildings.

Councilman Paul Vallone (D-Bayside) said last week the DOB had given the owners a "notice to revoke" on the ALT-1 work permit, which allows for no less than 50 percent of the structure being retained.

The property was purchased by Jia Hua Realty, a limited liability company based in Bayside that was formed in March 2014, according to city records. The owner identified herself as Lisa and said she had lived in New Jersey with her parents, husband and one child when she spoke to a TimesLedger staff two

According to the DOB web-The Bayside home that site, the property was inspected April 15 with no violations found, but this was before Vallone said the work permit had been revoked.

> The structure that once stood at three stories is now reduced to ground level.

> The work on the historic property caught the attention of Bonnie Skala Kiladitis, daughter of late activist Frank Skala, when she complained to Vallone, who sent a formal letter to the city Department of Buildings for the breach of its permit.

> After hearing from Vallone, the DOB issued a notice to revoke the building permit, pending the owner's answer to the objections.

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Soccer fields get rehab

\$1.5M Little Bay project kicked off at groundbreaking

Work has begun on a \$1.5 million renovation of Little Bay Park's two soccer fields.

Queens Parks Commissioner Dorothy Lewandowski and City Councilman Paul Vallone (D-Bayside) broke ground on the project Tuesday, which is expected to be completed in April 2017.

"We are excited to begin work on the next round of improvements to Little Bay Park. Upgrades to the soccer fields will allow players to get back in the game sooner after a rainfall, and additional site improvements will ensure a more enjoyable experience for athletes and spectators alike," Lewandowski said. "I would like to thank Council member Vallone, who has been an ardent supporter of this important green space along Queens' waterfront."

Vallone said the project had been approved by his predecessor, Dan Halloran, and a motion he planned to see through to completion.

"The kids in northeast Queens have some beautiful brand new soccer fields to look forward to," Vallone said. "The upgrades coming to the fields

at Little Bay Park will be a welcome addition to the community and will provide a great playing experience for everyone for years to come."

The soccer fields can be added to the list of other projects at the site in the past couple

years. An expanded parking lot with bioswales between the aisles to aid in stormwater management was completed in May 2015 and in February a new comfort station was built for public use.

"I have to thank the Parks Department because they really did go above and beyond working with community leaders, finding out the best way to spend this money," Vallone said. "So when we're done with this park next year, we'll be looking at two new fields."

The two new soccer fields offer a view of Throgs Neck Bridge and Little Bay, both of which were covered with fog when the ground-breaking ceremony began.

A new walking path and drinking fountain will be installed along the perimeter of the fields and trees will be installed to absorb stormwater.

Pedestrian island set for Flushing corner

The city Department of Transportation will install a pedestrian island at the intersection of 138th Street and 31st Road in Mitchell-Linden at the request of state Sen. Tony Avella (D-Bayside).

Avella had previously blasted the DOT for denying a request for an all-way stop at the intersection.

He held a news conference Sept. 25, with Arlene Fleishman, president of the Mitchell-Linden Civic Association and members of the North Flushing Senior Center to highlight the need for more traffic safety.

During the news conference, cars would frequently speed past the intersection as children held hands to cross the long crosswalk to travel to and from the nearby PS 214, according to Avella.

"It was absolutely vital for DOT to address the safety issues at 138th Street and 31st Road where cars frequently travelat dangerous speeds," he said. "I'm glad that they have finally listened to the community's concerns and have chosen to construct a concrete pedestrian triangle along the very long crosswalk."

This week, the DOT released its study of the intersection.

The report, presented by Pedestrian Projects Group Jan. 21 to Community Board 7's Transportation Committee, defined its project area as the residential area with PS 214, PS 242 and playground as well as access to Q34, Q43, QM20 and QM2 buses.

Between 2010 and 2014, the intersection has had four pedestrian injuries, one bicyclist injury classified as severe and two motor vehicle occupant injuries, according to data presented by the DOT. There were no fatalities at the intersection.

Current conditions at the intersection include unmarked crosswalks, long crossing distances, one uncontrolled marked school crosswalk and wide travel lanes encouraging speeding, according to the report.

The DOT will mark new high-visibility crosswalks at 138th Street and 31st Road and 137th Street and 29th Road as well as new enhanced crossing at 138th Street and 31st Road.

The agency will add the concrete triangle at the intersection and flush the median and parking lane stripes on 138th Street and 29th Road between 31st Road and 137th Street to visually narrow the corridor to slow down vehicles.

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Former Francis Lewis coach dies at 68 in N.C.

Randy James piloted both basketball and baseball programs while serving as dean

Longtime Francis Lewis boys' basketball and baseball coach Randy James died of leukemia April 25 in Charlotte, N.C., according to his former players. He was 68.

His death came as a shock and out of the blue to those who knew him back in New York. Former players such as Howard Ringer, who was on James' first basketball team, said they wished they had had a chance to be by his side and say goodbye. James was under hospice care when he died.

"We never got a chance to say bye to him," Ringer said. "It's a tough loss."

James coached both teams for more than 20 years. He took over the Lewis basketball program in 1980 after it changed coaches each of the previous two seasons, according to Ringer. His impact was immediate and lasting. He stayed on the bench for 23 years before retiring in 2004. James won


the school's only boys' basketball city title in 1995, a Class B crown, in a game played at Madison Square Garden.

"Just a great dude," Ringer said. "You don't get many good coaches in your lifetime. It was a blessing to have him.'

James, a graduate of East New York HS and Brooklyn College, also led the Patriots baseball team for 20 seasons before stepping down in 2007 to move to North Carolina and spend time with his family.

"To do it for that long and that many straight months showed the dedication that he had, because he starts in October and goes to June," Francis Lewis Athletic Director Arnie Rosenbaum said. "For all those years he gave up a lot to do that, but that was just him. He just loved to do it.'

He was a father figure to many of his players, whom he treated like his own kids. James has two daughters but hundreds for sons. He made an immediate impact in his

first basketball season, both in wins and the players' individual performance, Ringer said. He gave them the freedom to bring out the best in their games.

"He allowed us to be the players we were meant to be," Ringer said. "He didn't try to handcuff our game. He really allowed us to play."

Fred Burton, a first team


all-city selection as a senior who went on to play at Alabama and LIU, remembers jumping from six points per game as a freshman to 27 as a sophomore under James.

"He's one of the best coaches I've even had," Burton said.

He was more than just a coach at Lewis. James was also an English teacher, an assistant principal and dean in the school and part of its inaugural coaching Hall of Fame class last June. He was academic adviser at the famed ABCD basketball camps.

"He enjoyed it," Burton said. "He really got pleasure out of it, helping kids out. He was really strong on academics and all that stuff, too. He wasn't all about sports.'

Memorial services will be held May 6 at 11 a.m. at Mt. Carmel Baptist Church in Charlotte. A memorial in New York is being planned for a later date, according to James' Facebook account.


Mayor proposes water tax credit and other investments

Nearly 277,500 private homeowners in Queens will receive a \$183 tax credit this summer as Mayor Bill de Blasio decided to no longer request a rental payment from the city Water Board, saving \$244 million next year and \$268 million in fiscal year 2018. He announced Monday that the fees New Yorkers pay will be dedicated solely to the operation, maintenance and expansion of the water and sewer system.

"For decades the city has been using the water bill as a cash cow for the general treasury," de Blasio said. "That's not right. The water bill should be for one thing and one thing only -- the cost of water. Our water is safe and pure but it costs to keep it that way. This credit will provide some relief as we work to keep water and sewer bills as low as possible.'

Councilman Rory Lancman (D-Hillcrest) has aggressively advocated for the city to stop the water rate rental payment, said. "For years the city has stolen homeowners' water taxes to pad the general fund through the guise of excessive 'rental payments' demanded of the Water Board for using the water and sewer infrastructure that keeps New York running, and today's de-

cision to abandon this swindle is good news."

The mayor proposed the one-time credit be applied to all of the more than 664,000 one- to three-family homes across the city. It was written into his \$82.2 billion Executive Budget for Fiscal Year 2017 presented Tuesday that has many items that will please Queens residents.

The budget includes \$21

million in capital funding for smaller, specialized snow removal equipment for the Department of Sanitation in response to Winter Storm Jonas that paralyzed the borough with over 30 inches of snow in late January. More than 70 snow plows became stuck on narrow streets.

"This new funding will make our streets safer for



Queens animal shelter will be borough's first

Dogs, cats and other animals of all shapes, sizes and stripes will soon have a new city shelter in Queens-the first of its kind in the bor-

In the release of his new fiscal year 2017 budget Tuesday, Mayor Bill de Blasio announced that more than \$10 million in capital funding would be allocated for two new animal shelters—one in Queens and one in the Bronx. The funding marked the largest investment in the animalshelter system since the city government first took over operations of the shelters more than 20 years ago, according to the mayor's office.

The city contracts with Animal Care Centers of NYC to run the shelters. ACC operates three full-service animal shelters in Manhattan, Brooklyn and Staten Island, and has two animal admission centers in Queens and the Bronx.

With a new Queens shelter, animals could be medically treated at the site, missing animals could be properly sheltered and people could directly adopt animals at the location. Animals found in Queens are currently transported from the admission center to another borough's shelter for the full range of services.

"Our animal shelters deliver services to upwards of 35,000 animals," Mayor de Blasio said, referring to the number of animals taken in per year. "These two new shelters in Queens and in the Bronx-boroughs that com-

bined see more than 14,000 cats and dogs—will increase the city's bandwidth to ensure that all missing, homeless and abandoned animals within the city receive the care they need.'

The mayor's office said the city took in 9,328 cats and 5,834 dogs from Queens and the Bronx in 2014. The three shelters operated by the ACC are not no-kill shelters, according to the website of animal advocacy group No Kill

The plans for the funding include \$2 million in FY 2017 to design the shelters followed by an additional \$8 million in the following fiscal year to acquire land. According to a spokesman from the mayor's office, a more concrete timeline on construction and a proposed date for the opening of the facilities will be released once the city has selected and acquired the land.

In recent years, the mayor's office allocated \$3.5 million in capital funds for the Brooklyn shelter for renovations and \$5 million for the Manhattan ACC shelter to help transform a garage into a new adoption center. The heads of ACC and the ASPCA both lauded the funding the mayor's office had allotted for the new shelters.

"This money may finally bring full-service shelters to the Bronx and Queens, dramatically improving the chances for local animals to get adopted and find safe and loving homes," said Matt Bershadker, president and chief executive officer of the ASPCA.

Queens voters reflect demographics

Southeast Queens, older residents back Clinton, while Trump sweeps his native land

The preferences of Queens voters mirrored city and statewide trends in the April 19 New York presidential primaries, with Hillary Clinton and Donald Trump claiming dominant victories throughout most of the borough.

Donald Trump handily bested his Republican rivals, according to an analysis from the Center for Urban Research at the CUNY Graduate Center that was based on unofficial city Board of Election returns from the night of the election. Trump won overwhelmingly in Middle Village, Howard Beach and throughout much of northeastern Queens.

Michael Krasner, a professor of political science at Queens College and the co-director of the Taft Institute for Government, said the Republican results were expected in the context of Trump's appeal with white working-class Republicans who desire a "strong leader" and who view illegal

immigration and shifting social changes with trepidation.

They want someone who is going to cut through red tape and procedure and just get things done," he said. "And that's what Trump promises to do."

Krasner also speculated that Queens native Trump enjoyed a hometown advantage from being so closely associated with the city, and said U.S. Sen. Ted Cruz (R-Texas)likely damaged his chances in New York when he criticized "New York values" during a Jan. 14 presidential debate.

Krasner said the Democratic contest also reflected national trends. U.S. Sen. Bernie Sanders, an Independent running as a Democrat, won in areas like Ridgewood, Astoria and Middle Village, which have large concentrations of white, younger working-class voters. Clinton prevailed in northeastern Queens neighborhoods with sizable percentages of older voters, as well as in areas like Jamaica, St. Al-

bans and Queens Village that had higher rates of African-American voters.

"Clinton has had from the beginning a substantial advantage in African-American communities," Krasner said, and noted that her prominence on the national stage worked to her advantage with older voters. "She's a more familiar candidate than Bernie. It's been hard for him to make a dent with people who have a long acquaintance with Clin-

Krasner said while New York state's closed primary system likely hurt Sanders' chances because independents were unable to vote for him, he had still expected Sanders to capture liberal enclaves throughout the city that eventually went to Clinton, including the West Village and the Upper West Side in Manhattan. He speculated that Sanders' stances on gun control may have hurt him with city liberals.

Registered Democrats in Queens vastly outnumber other parties, according to state Board of Elections data. According to the BOE, Queens had 722,740 registered Democrats as of April 1, as opposed

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Comptroller announces plan to audit Board of Elections

City Comptroller Scott Stringer's office is launching an audit of the city Board of Elections following Primary Day problems in the five boroughs, including the dropping of 120,000 voters from the rolls in Brooklyn.

In a letter BOE Executive Director Michael Ryan, Stringer pointed out the major issues that occurred and demanded an explanation to prevent issues from continuing in future elections.

Some problems mentioned in the letter were hitches in poll station operations, weak communication with voters, poor training for poll workers and voter disenfranchisement from purged voter rolls.

Sliwa was encouraged to run for the position when he emceed a Queens Republican Party gala April 11, where he first discussed his plans. But he announced he would oppose the mother of his two children at the Juniper Park Civic Association meeting last week. He would have to move from Brooklyn to Queens and since he is registered with the Reform Party, he would have time to switch to the Republican Party or the party would have to cross-endorse him. Katz is a U.S. Rep. Joe Crowley (D-Democrat.

"They were telling me that I had enough time to get my house in order since I wouldn't have to file until June," Sliwa said.

He said that in recent communications with Katz, she has been "very cool, very steely" but that they only talk about their sons, Hunter and

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Sen. Stavisky launches re-election campaign

State Sen. Toby Stavisky (D-Flushing) formally launched her re-election campaign in Forest Hills Monday afternoon as U.S. Rep. Grace Meng (D-Flushing) and community leaders from Flushing and Forest Hills praised the senator's work.

Speaking right near Geraldine Ferraro Way on Ascan Avenue and Austin Street, which was named for the late congresswoman and the first female U.S. vice presidential nominee of a major political party, Stavisky touted accomplishments such as the Women's Equality Agenda, the lowest tax rate on the middle class in the last 70 years in this year's budget, the tuition freeze at SUNY and CUNY and an increase of 6 percent in state aid to education throughout the state.

But she said ethics reform is "long overdue," noting that LLC (limited liability corporation) loophole must be closed and for limits to be placed on elected officials' outside incomes. She also called for more diversity in specialized high schools and for the Dream Act legislation enabling undocumented students who graduated from high schools in New York City to apply for college financial aid to be passed.

"I believe that we are going to nominate a woman for president," she said. "Women have to be given the opportunity. In the state Senate, there are 12 women. We were all excited when the number increased this year from 11 to 12 out of 63 and we've got to do something about that."

Meng, who co-hosted the event and has worked with Stavisky for years, reminded attendees that Stavisky was the first woman in Queens to be elected to the state Senate and reiterated the significance of the news conference being held at Geraldine Ferraro Way.

She noted the role that Stavisky played in bringing the public school holiday for Lunar New Year to fruition.

"Any issue that people bring up to her, she's always right there, not just for a photo-op but for multiple meetings in front of the press, behind closed doors," Meng said. "Whatever it takes to find a solution to a problem, Senator Stavisky is always leading the charge."

Peter Tu, executive director of the Flushing Chinese Business Association; Flushing Democratic District Leader Martha Flores Vazquez; Joe Nocerino, a Forest Hills community leader; Ikhwan Rim, president of the Union Street Small Business Association; and Jeff Huang, a plumbing contractor in downtown Flushing spoke in support of the senator.

Her challenger, S.J. Jung, former president of the MinKwon Center for Community Action, said her campaign sent out negative mailers and disseminated deceitful information through phone call programs during the 2014 cycle when he ran against her. He said the focus should be on the issues affecting Queens residents.

"I was very disappointed in 2014 by Sen. Stavisky's tactics and I hope that this year she can steer clear of negative campaigning," Jung said.

SE Queens to get new 116th Pct. - at last

Mayor de Blasio sets aside \$70M for police patrol area to be carved out of sprawling 105th

When Mayor Bill de Blasio unveiled his executive budget this week, it included a major victory for Councilmen Donovan Richards (D-Laurelton) and Barry Grodenchik (D-Oakland Gardens)-\$70 million allocated to fund a new police precinct to relieve the overburdened 105th Precinct.

The 105th is the fourth largest precinct in the city, with 188,000 people living within its boundaries. It stretches from Glen Oaks and North Shore Towers in the north to Kennedy Airport through Queens Village and Laurelton. It is also known to have the slowest 911 response times in comparison to its neighboring precincts in eastern Queens.

A 24-hour satellite of the 105th was established in 2007 at 242-40 North Conduit Ave. to alleviate these issues, and it received an expansion in March. But the need for a fully serviced, stand-alone 116th Precinct has nott escaped the attention of the Queens lawmakers.

"For nearly four decades, of residents Laurelton, Rosedale and Springfield Gardens have been calling for the 116th Precinct and the city has finally delivered in 2016,' Richards said. "Since I became the Council member for District 31 in 2013, the creation of a new precinct has been one of the loftiest goals I have set my sights on. 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Markey pushes passage of Child Victims rights

In her push to eliminate the statute of limitations for child sex abuse crimes, state Assemblywoman Margaret Markey (D-Maspeth) and supporters of the Child Victims Act will lobby the Legislature in Albany for passage of the reform bill. The CVA has been adopted in the Assembly four times in various forms since 2006, but has never made it to the floor of the Senate.

"New York is among the very worst states in America for how it treats victims of childhood sexual abuse," Markey said. "We rank right at the very bottom among the 50 states along with Alabama and Mississippi. This is the year to change that deplorable situation. Now the CVA has more than 60 co-sponsors in the Assembly and visitors are coming to tell legislators in both houses they want to see the law changed this year."

The two-day lobby effort will include a roundtable forum Tuesday, May 3, which will be moderated by Benjamin Cardozo Law Professor Marci Hamilton, a national advocate for statute-of-limitations reform. Participants will include Olympic speedskater Bridie Farrell, who has accused speedskater Andy Gabel of molesting her in 1997, when she was just 15. Farrell was unable to pur-

sue criminal prosecution or a civil lawsuit against Gabel because New York's statute of limitations bars victims from proceeding with cases after their 23rd birthday.

Abuse victims are often very slow to come to grips with what happened to them, some not until middle age or even later in life, according to Markey.

Documentary filmmaker Chris Gavagan, whose film "Coached into Silence" explores sex abuse at all levels of youth sports while detailing his own experience at the hands of a hockey coach, will take part in the roundtable. Advocate Peter Brooks of the Horace Mann Action Coalition; attorney Kevin Mulhearn, who has represented survivors from Poly Prep and Yeshiva University High School; and survivor Ronald Savage, author of a recent personal memoir accusing a hip hop legend of abuse, will also take part.

A second roundtable, hosted by Markey and state Sen. Brad Hoylman (D-Manhattan), sponsor of the CVA in the Senate, will be held the following day. It will focus on chronic violations in the Catholic Church as reflected in the Academy Award-winning film "Spotlight," which tells the story of the Boston Globe's investigation into sexual abuse by priests. The program will include Oscar-

Benefit aids Ecuador

Members of local union travel to assist quake victims

Hundreds turned out for a benefit Sunday afternoon that raised money for victims of the earthquake that hit Ecuador April 16.

The event at La Boom Restaurant in Woodside raised more than \$10,000 for UNICEF to assist survivors. Members of a local union also flew to the battered country this week to offer assistance.

"Whateverweraise, Queens is going to send that message of hope, that we're going to put our little grain of salt in to help our Ecuadorean brothers and sisters," state Sen. Jose Peralta (D-East Elmhurst) said. "The other day it was Ecuador, but tomorrow it could be any other country."

The earthquake's death toll has exceeded 650 people, and some 16,600 people were injured. Several attendees at the benefit said they had friends and family who still had loved ones missing in the South American nation. The

earthquake measured a 7.8 on the Richter scale and it demolished nearly 7,000 buildings.

As Latin singers performed at the benefit, 20 members of Laborers' International Union of North America Local 78 were flying to Ecuador to assist in recovery efforts. Byron Silva, the union's assistant business manager, later said the crew had set up camp at a university in Portoviejo, a city near the country's western coast that was heavily damaged by the quake. According to Silva, the team was helping to set up tents for Ecuadoreans who had lost their homes and were also waiting for clearance from the Ecuadorean government to participate in the removal of bodies and whatever other services they could offer.

Silva said the group of 20 was well-experienced in dealing with hazardous materials from their work at Ground Zero after 9/11 and during the cleanup that followed Superstorm Sandy. The union

represents employees who specialize in asbestos, lead and hazardous waste removal.

"With 9/11, there was complete destruction, and they were handling hazardous materials in the air. We imagine it'll be the same in Ecuador," he said, noting that he was worried about asbestos that had dispersed into the air in the aftermath of the quake. "In the United States, we have heavy regulations for asbestos, but we don't have the same regulations in South America. So we really don't know."

During the event, U.S. Rep. Joseph Crowley (D-Jackson Heights) said he hoped Ecuadoreans could attain Temporary Protected Status in the United States, which would mean undocumented immigrants from Ecuador would not be required to leave the United States as they would under standard regulations.

"We want to give people there and here reprieve until it's safer to go back home," he said.

Bklyn man convicted of sex abuse on 7 train

FLUSHING — A registered sex offender living in Brooklyn has been convicted of having sexual contact with a 13-year-old girl and a 23-year-old woman on the 7 train on the same day in 2013, the Queens district attorney said.

Paul Kingsley, 56, was seen rubbing against a 13-year-old girl's leg and thigh while aboard a Flushing-bound 7 train on Dec. 6, 2013, according to DA Richard Brown.

One of two officers followed him as he boarded the Manhattan-bound 7 train where he saw Kingsley rubbing himself on a 23-year-old woman's butt several stops away, Brown said.

Kingsley was designated a sexually violent offender and predicate sex offender when he was required to register for life with the New York State Sex Offender Registry in 2001 following convictions in North Carolina and Syracuse for sexually abusing, in each case, a 9-year-old girl in a library, Brown said.

He was convicted of sexual abuse, forcible touching, endangering the welfare of a child and harassment following a five-day jury trial, the district attorney said.

Kingsley, who has been held in jail on a Strict and Intensive Supervision and Treatment parole warrant since his arraignment, faces up to two years in prison at sentencing on June 14, Brown said.

He faces indefinite commitment in a psychiatric facility for allegedly violating the terms of his parole, Brown said.


Police arrest suspect in 2015 triple murder

SOUTH JAMAICA — A suspect in a triple murder from September has been arrested, according to the NYPD.

Allen Cooper, 32, was arrested and charged with three counts of murder and three counts of criminal possession of a weapon April 22. On Sept. 20, 2015, police from the 88th Precinct responded to calls about shots fired at 58 Fleet Walk in downtown Brooklyn.

After arriving, police found three victims, including Lacount Simmons, 39, and Herbert Brown, 76 from Brooklyn, and Calvin Clinkscales, 43, who lived at 160-05 North Conduit Ave. in South Jamaica. Clinkscales and Simmons were pronounced dead at the scene, and Brown was brought to Methodist Hospital, where he later died.

Police identified Cooper, who also

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
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UEENS ON A ROLL

Queens sometimes feels like the forgotten borough—an afterthought in the city's public mind with Manhattan and Brooklyn grabbing the spotlights.

When the mayor released his budget proposals for the next fiscal year, Queens was on the top of the list for some of the major projects in the city.

He set aside funds for another police precinct in southeast Queens, reconstruction of the Koch-Queensborough Bridge and the first animal shelter in the borough. Queens' January blizzard gridlock also got some attention, with money allocated for smaller snow plows to navigate narrow streets.

Factor into the happy-times equation a proposal by the city comptroller to tax commercial jet fuel at the two Queens airports and the borough is on a roll.

Mayor Bill de Blasio earmarked \$70 million to create of a new 116th Precinct covering Rosedale, Springfield Gardens and Brookville. These communities are now part of the overstretched 105th Precinct, a 13-square-mile area which runs along the Queens border from Glen Oaks to the Kennedy Airport area.

Residents have been clamoring for years for an additional precinct to reduce slow response times and better balance the needs of the southern end, where serious crime is more prevalent, against the quieter northern section.

The pothole-ridden Queensborough Bridge, scene of loose hub caps rolling at will, has earned a face-lift and the borough's abandoned animals will finally have a safe haven.

In another plus, the mayor allocated \$292 million for more sewer work in southeast Queens, where low-lying areas frequently flood.

City Comptroller Scott Stringer came out with a report chastising the state for giving commercial airlines a free ride by not charging them the 4.5 percent sale tax every Queens motorist pays at the pump. He estimated that taxing jet fuel at Kennedy and LaGuardia airports would produce revenues of about \$100 million a year, based on today's prices.

Stringer said the windfall should go toward building an AirRail link from Willets Point to LaGuardia and installing green roofs at the two Queens airports to help offset their contribution to the global greenhouse gas problem.

Airline passengers would then pay for the use of our airspace since the airlines pass taxes along to the traveler, but Queens deserves a break as increasing jet noise shatters an already uneasy peace.

Add in the 227,000 Queens homeowners who are getting a water bill tax credit of \$183 for what has turned out to be a very good week.

Co-ops are the enemy of affordability

A recent StreetEasy analysis of all types of rentals has shown that the median rent-to-income ratio averaged 65.2 percent in New York City in 2016—twothirds of renters' income spent on rent. Although lagging income growth contributes to rent affordability, the problem is an effect of the depletion of rent-stabilized apartments due to co-ops, which have abolished a large population of rental units from the 1980s onward upon conversion of buildings to cooperatives.

Renters in non-eviction con-

versions became undesirables from New York State rent-stabifrom the perspective of co-op shareholders, who, aside from sponsors or investors, inflated the petty bourgeoisie. Every city block became flooded with presidents of co-op boards, and a board, albeit elected, functioned as a fascist political entity, with a disfranchisement of citizens from state rent-stabilization protections.

landlords converted Some their buildings to co-ops, then bought back the units, only to rent them as sublets, immune lization guidelines and New York City Rent Stabilization Board rent-increase limitations; likewise, shareholders capitalized by subletting their units. So marketrate apartments have become the norm, and the affordability crisis has worsened in the city. Co-ops are the bane of New York, and should be swiftly abolished.

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Homeowners need a say in landmarking

over 30 years and have supported the Broadway-Flushing Homeowners' Association's efforts to improve and enforce zoning and building codes, as well as the Rickert-Finlay Covenant. I cannot, however, support its quest to permit an unelected, unaccountable bureaucracy to usurp a portion of our property rights—that is, to impose landmark designation.

In an effort to obtain New York City Landmark designation, the association requested the homeowners to vote for or against seeking landmark designation. According to the law, landmark designation is not the subject of a vote by the

I have lived in Flushing for community or homeowners, and notification to homeowners is not required.

In response to my concerns regarding landmark designation, the Law Department of New York City apprised me that "a formal application process does not exist. The commission considers eligible buildings and districts for designation in response to suggestions from many sources, including groups and individuals as well as the observations of commission members and staff. While the Landmarks Commission seeks and encourages community and property owners' participation and support when considering proposed landmark designations, neither is

a required condition for the designation of a landmark." The letter continues "...the determination as to whether a building or a district is to be landmarked is not the subject of a referendum or vote by the community or property owners." It is clear the wishes and desires of the homeowners are superfluous.

If these facts are not sufficient to prompt a pause in the cause for designation, consider the regulations and restrictions on private property. Designation requires homeowners to apply for and receive permits for most work, to consult with architects or contractors approved to work on historic buildings, to

wait 20 to 90 days for a permit which will give permission to paint wood, masonry or handrails a different color, install exterior light fixtures, install new window sashes or frames, paint doors and door frames a different color, replace roofing material, install yard light-

Invoking landmark laws to resolve problems resulting from un-enforced building codes, inadequate zoning laws, indiscriminate variances, corruption and lack of oversight is disingenuous. This is neither the intent nor spirit of the Landmark Laws. Restricting and regulating homeowners' property rights may stifle their proclivity to

enhance and enrich the "gracious sense of place" they created in the first place.

The character and "sense of place" the association cites that distinguishes our neighborhood consists of many elements. Among them are the increasing number of local store front signs, ads, and posters that are undecipherable to many residents. In the interest of "preserving our neighborhood," perhaps BFHA should instead seek landmarking of the English language.

I implore my neighbors to get informed and assert their common sense.

When is a student college ready?

I'd like to address the current policy of Bayside High School with regard to students and Regents.

The school has a "college ready" policy which requires students to attain an 80 on the Algebra Regents, an arbitrary grade established by CUNY. Although this sounds like an admirable policy—who doesn't want their students college ready?—in reality it is a money pit to the school and soul-killing to the students.

If a student passes algebra in ninth grade, then passes the Algebra Regents in June with a 75, 10 points over the passing grade required by the state, the student is scheduled to take the test again in August because they aren't deemed college ready.

If the student gets a 79 or 65, or any number in between in August, they are scheduled into another algebra class for 10th grade and subject to taking the Regents again in December, June and August. If they don't reach the 80, they just keep taking the Regents over and over, accompanied by as many semesters of algebra refresher classes as the school chooses to schedule them into.

For dozens of otherwise successful students at Bayside HS, this has been an ongoing nightmare. Graduating seniors aren't exempt from this abuse. Students who are accepted into the college of their

choice are taking algebra refresher classes and required to take the Regents in June. This is not a responsible use of school funding.

Any student who refuses this treatment is put on academic probation and can't play sports or participate in school activities, including the prom. Is this the way we want our high school to treat a student who passes every class, has earned a Regents diploma, plays sports, sits on the student council and volunteers at school events? I don't want my student treated with such disregard.

Online reservation business teams with lot owner in downtown Jamaica for new venture

An online parking reservation business has joined forces with a lot near the perennially busy Jamaica LIRR stop to offer cheap off-street parking.

The company's president said that the new service could help alleviate the significant challenges the area faces from traffic congestion.

"We want to help commuters and help parking customers be able to buy their parking before they leave home," Mara Reuben, the president of ParkNSave, said about the business' new partnership with Excel Parking NYC.

ParkNSave was founded in 2014 and is a division of Intellipark, Inc. The system enables owners of garages and lots to monetize their vacant spots. Customers can rent the spots online or on their smartphone, and the company is currently developing an app to make the process quicker.

The Jamaica garage is at 89-36 Sutphin Blvd. and offers 118 spots for rent. The rates include a two- to 15-day purchase for \$14 a day and an introductory 30-day rental pass for \$220. Several other parking lots reported rates from \$150 to \$250, although some of those did not offer 24/7 storage.

The area immediately sur-

rounding the Jamaica LIRR stop and AirTrain to JFK Airport, at the corner of Archer Avenue and Sutphin Boulevard, has long been a bane on commuters and shoppers seeking parking.

Reuben estimated that in urban congested traffic approximately 30 percent of cars are searching for parking. Many drivers eventually give up on the search, but Reuben said that some continue to look for free or cheap on-street parking, and will not park in paid lots. She said this resulted in a loss of off-street parking revenue as well as an increase in pollutants from idling drivers, an issue she found was prevalent in Queens.

"That's why we're really excited to enter this market in this location," she said. "We want to go near the transportation hub, near the courthouse, where there are many restaurants. This is a center for commuters, for people who have to be there or need to be there."

Reuben said that the company's attempt to offer affordable off-street parking was in reaction to the disparity in cost between on-street metered parking and off-street parking. The low cost of meters offered an incentive to commuters to

continue seeking the elusive on-street parking spot. To break that tendency, Reuben said that off-street parking would need to be more affordable and easily accessible for

If the model worked, Reuben believed off-street parking vendors could begin to recoup the revenue lost each year, which, according to her, totaled more than \$100 million in New York City.

"We want to monetize those vacancies," she said. "When we look at the convenience and value of a pre-purchased parking space at a discount, we're solving the issue felt very keenly here in New York City."

ParkNSave operates in more than 30 different lots or garages around the city, and intends to add two new garages in Queens soon, in addition to the Jamaica location.

"We need to be more effective and efficient for parking customers to solve what is a national and international problem of congestion in cities," she said.

Computer center opens in Flushing

Flushing residents will become more technology-savvy thanks to a new computer center recently opened at the Chinese-American Planning Council's site in downtown Flushing.

The center, called the TWC Learning Lab, funded by a \$52,000 grant from Time Warner Cable, will be incorporated into the council's educational programs. Time Warner Cable Business Class will also provide complimentary highspeed business Internet and TV services.

Janice Won, the council's interim president and CEO, said she is honored that the council will be the first communitybased organization to receive two TWC Learning Labs.

"There are overwhelming needs in immigrant communities for access to state-of-the-art technology and secure and reliable Internet connection and the TWC Learning Lab in our new Queens Community Center will be a great resource for the Flushing community," Won said. Wajeeha Aziz, Time

Warner Cable's vice president of technical operations for Brooklyn and Queens, echoed similar sentiments, noting that the labs exist in 19 other locations in New York City.

"Time Warner Cable is proud to partner with such a strong organiza-

tion like CPC to help bridge the digital divide for Flushing residents and provide them with access to e-learning programs," Aziz said.

The council's new lab has computers, laptops, tablets, computer software and high-definition televisions. The council will be able to provide new and refined courses in areas such as college readiness and vocational training, English as a Second Language, resumé writing and interviewing for jobs. People will also be able to conduct online employment searches.

In 2011, TWC committed to opening 40 labs in New York City by 2020 to offer low-income communities access to computers and high-speed Internet. Its total investment to equip the labs is expected to surpass \$2 million. TWC's Time Warner Cable Business Class will also be providing in-kind funding from Time Warner Cable Business Class.

Time Warner Cable already opened 20 labs in New York City neighborhoods. In Queens alone, there are labs open at the Variety Boys and Girls Club of Queens, Woodside on the Move, Sunnyside Community Services, Rockaway Development & Revitalization Corporation, Greater Ridgewood Youth Council and Korean Community Services,

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Tax airlines: Stringer



City Comptroller Scott Stringer says it is time for the city to end a tax giveaway and make big airlines pay city sales tax on fuel, just like drivers at the pump.

On Earth Day last Friday, City Comptroller Scott Stringer blasted a tax giveaway that allows airlines at LaGuardia and JFK airports to avoid paying city sales tax on airline fuel.

The exemption costs the city anywhere between \$100 million and \$200 million a year — revenue which, he said, could be used to modernize and green the airports that are consistently ranked among the worst in the

Stringer noted that a tax on jet fuel would create a new funding stream to help support Gov. Andrew Cuomo's \$5 billion project to reconstruct LaGuardia and build a new rail link that would reduce the number of passengers arriving and leaving by private car.

"U.S. airlines have been flying for free when it comes to paying a sales tax on jet fuel, and it's time to make them pay their fair share," Stringer said. "Ending this giveaway would help New York City and the Port Authority secure the funds they need to modernize and green our airports, helping cut down on soaring emissions from the aviation industry."

Unlike millions of New Yorkers who pay the city's 4.5 percent sales tax everytime they fill up at the pump and with the price of jet fuel at a 12-year low, Stinger said the carriers racked up a record \$29 billion in profits last year. Airlines are hit with refueling sales taxes in San Francisco, Chicago and Los Angeles County, according to Stringer.

'There's no good reason why airlines should be exempt from a tax that the rest of us pay every day, whether we are buying a sandwich or filling up at the pump," Stringer said. "By levying city sales tax on jet fuel, our city can invest in transforming our airports into models of sustainability that can help mitigate the enormous footprint of air travel."

Joseph Sitt, founder of Global Gateway Alliance, which advocates for improved airports, backed Stringer's call for a new city tax to help fund airport improvement projects.

'New York airports need billions to finally make them world class instead of Third World, so dedicated new revenue sources are the right approach," Sitt said.

Schumer pushes Zika spending bill

U.S. Sen. Charles Schumer (D-NY) is pushing for federal emergency funding to combat the spread of the Zika virus. Schumer said more than 800 Americans have already contracted the mosquito-born virus, with 60 confirmed cases in New York state.

"With so many women and families across the country looking for action, it is critical that members of Congress work together to greenlight at least \$1 billion in emergency funding as soon as possible so that we can help stem the spread of Zika," Schumer said. "Simply put, anyone repellent to this emergency funding plan isn't serious about beating Zika. When it comes to fighting this epidemic, a stitch in time will save nine and so, I will do everything in my power to make sure emergency funding is delivered.'

President Obama's supplemental emergency funding request includes a comprehensive response to the virus. Overall, the federal funds would allow the United States to take critical steps at home and abroad.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recently confirmed the link between Zika during pregnancy and severe birth defects like microcephaly. The plan would improve mosquito control, expand access to family planning and contraceptives and accelerate efforts to develop a vaccine.





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Community imagines new designs for Pavilion

Organizations sponsor event at Queens Library in Flushing to promote idea competition

A collection of organizations sponsored an event outside the Flushing Queens Library Sunday that encouraged the Flushing community to engage their imaginations on how best to use the New York State Pavilion site in Flushing Meadows Corona Park.

"We're inviting folks to come and reimagine what it could be," said Beatriz Gil, the co-founder of Hibridos Collective. "We feel very strongly about presenting it in a public forum."

The New York State Pavilion was built as a part of the 1964 World's Fair and included three towers; the "Tent of Tomorrow," which included steel frameworks and a floor emblazoned with a Texaco map of New York State; and a performance venue currently housing the Queens Theatre. As the decades passed, the towers and the tent fell into disrepair and now sit unused.

In 2014, the city allocated about \$5.8 million to restore the pavilion and last summer the tent's steel framework was repainted. The National Trust for Historic Preservation and the People for the Pavilion teamed up earlier this year to organize the New York State Pavilion Ideas Competition, where community members could create designs and plans on how the space could best be used. Hibridos Collective was helping to organize the public events, saying that a previous session was held at the Queens Theatre last month.

"We're still trying to get out information about the pavilion," Salmaan Khan, the co-founder of People for the Pavilion, said. "It was always meant to be a fluid, functional public space."

Khan said it was unheard of for such a vast swath of public space in the city to remain inaccessible.

"It's so bizarre and antithetical to New York City, where

"It seems like something that was beautiful that just died," she said, while she sketched a rendering of the pavilion that included a carousel, a drawing room and a telescope in one of the towers.

Khan said he hoped that the competition would increase awareness of the pavilion so New Yorkers might see it as more than an antiquated relic from the past.

"People see it as abandoned and that's what will always be," he said. "We want to show that that's not the case."

A selection of judges, including design experts, elected officials and Queens leaders, will decide on the top three designs, and there is also a chance to vote online for a fan favorite. All the designs can be viewed at www.nyspideas.org and Khan said there would be a exhibition of the top designs at the Queens Museum in Au-

Andrew Campbell calls his days studying at CUNY campus a 'wonderful experience'



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

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

pedestrians and vehicles by purchasing smaller equipment that will help DSNY deftly navigate snowy streets and clear crosswalks and bus stops," de Blasio said.

The Executive Budget includes an investment of almost \$2 billion in New York Health + Hospitals to address a growing financial shortfall in the largest municipal health system in the nation The city will also make a \$100 million investment in critical, new infrastructure shifting from inpatient care to ambulatory care and outpatient services.

"This multibillion-dollar investment will stabilize and improve our city's public healthcare system," City Councilman Daniel Dromm (D-Jackson Heights) said. Elmhurst Hospital, a public hospital in my district, serves thousands of uninsured and undocumented New Yorkers each month. These dollars will help ensure that facilities like Elmhurst Hospital are adequately staffed and have the resources

they need to care for all New Yorkers regardless of immigration status or income level."

The mayor plans to triple the number of intensive-care mental health units on Rikers Island with \$8.7 million in FY 2017, a \$5 million investment will add an additional 50 more ambulance tours in Queens and the Bronx where response times are slowest. Queens and the Bronx will also divide \$10 million in capital funding for two new fullservice animal shelters.

The budget includes \$244 to replace the upper roadway of the Ed Koch Queensboro Bridge, which is reaching the end of its useful life. Work is expected to take four years.

"The Ed Koch Queensboro Bridge, one of the city's iconic bridges spanning the East River, will benefit from this necessary funding and continue its role effectively moving hundreds of thousands of people daily," de Blasio

"I won't be happy until he'sindicted in the Eastern district...for political corruption like a lot of his previous members," he said.

Sliwa said Katz bears some responsibility for it.

"I don't claim she's corrupt—I know for a fact she's not—but she oversees the power that keeps Crowley and the others in position," he said.

A spokeswoman for Katz said she would not comment for the sake of their sons.

"The borough president's children are now old enough to read the papers and Google their parents' names," the spokeswoman said. "As such, the borough president will reserve any further comment at this time."

Bob Turner, chairman of the Queens Republican Party, urged Sliwa to run, saying he would be "an interesting and fun candidate."

"It would bring a lot of attention to the Queens race," Turner said. "He also knows a good deal of all the subjects that are important to us. I think he could make a very good candidate."

He said the borough president race is usually "fairly dull" and that Sliwa's entry "would change things."

"We haven't nominated anyone, we haven't vetted anyone, but I would encourage Curtis to go ahead with this and I would be supportive of his efforts," he added. "I understand that's a little bit different than getting the nomination at this point but we've got a long way to go here."

Anthony Nunziato, treasurer for the Juniper Park Civic Association, said Sliwa hit on key issues that matter to residents.

"They're (residents) ready to hear what everyone has to offer and who will do the best job for Queens," Nunziato said.

Sliwa's ex-wife, Mary, sued Katz and Sliwa to recoup some of the child support Sliwa paid to Katz.

Katz and Sliwa told the Post in April 2012 that she asked him to make a sperm donation after her ovary was removed in 1998 and that they had grown apart by 2000 when Sliwa married Mary, whom he divorced in 2012.

Briarwood artist's life celebrated

Ida Piller-Greenspan's prints tell a horrific story of survival in Europe during World War II

BY MERLE EXIT

After viewing an exhibition of Ida Piller-Greenspan's monoprints and hearing the artist relate her tale of escaping from the Nazis, an editor suggested she put her story down in book form because it was, "so haunting."

Published about a decade ago, "When the World Closed Its Doors: Struggling to Escape Nazi-Occupied Europe" was written by Susan M. Branting based on interviews with Piller-Greenspan and using the artists' prints.

Born in Poland and raised in Antwerp, Belgium, Piller-Greenspan, who settled in Briarwood with her husband, Maurice Piller, to raise their daughters, used art

to create a pictorial diary of my parents' escape when she learned I was pregnant with my first

to share her horrific past child," daughter Rosie Piller said. "The pictorial diary was based on "My mother decided her memories, which were not always clear and crisp. These prints are meant to portray 'an indistinct, dream-like

quality."

Ida and Maurice Piller's story begins on their wedding night, May 9, 1940, when the Nazis invaded Belgium.

As the story progresses, the reader learns of the couple's ordeal the bottom of the boat,' when evading the Nazis and trying to obtain visas to any country that would allow the young Jews to settle. During that time most of Piller-Greenspan's family were deported and killed in Auschwitz.

As they lived on rations of fruit, eggs and sometimes dog biscuits, the fear of having to return to occupied Belgium or any country overcome by the Nazis stirred great feats of strength and endurance as anti-Semitism was widespread.

Visas finally came from the United States.

"On June 3, 1941, two days before my 22nd birthday, we walked up the metal gangway and into steerage, the third-class section in

Piller-Greenspan said in the book. "We did not know whether we would be turned away when we reached the United States or sent on some hopeless journey from one country to another...We could not know whether the United States would close its doors."

Once in Briarwood, the couple set up a small diamond wholesale busi-

Maurice, who by then had changed his name to Morris, would do the buying and selling, and Piller-Greenspan would help by sorting the diamonds, Piller said.

After being widowed in 1965, Piller-Greenspan tried to keep the business

Approaching 50 years in Bayside, the Marbella Restaurant specializes in Spanish cuisine, and contains a spacious room for entertainment.



married Joseph Greenspan and stopped working outside the home in order to turn her attention to her growing family, including sons Mark and Danny Greenspan.


She also focused on her art, eventually earning a bachelor of fine arts from Queens College on her 60th birthday in caust. She worked in realism,

arrives at the bee alone and lacking the \$25 entry fee

William Barfée, who is always correcting the mis-pronouncation of his last name, "It is Bar-FAY, not BARF-ee, there is an accent aigu," is played by Patrick Halley. William is probably on the autism spectrum, and spells by using his shoe to mime writing the words on the floor — which he describes in humorous detail in his solo, "Magic Foot."

Last year's returning champion Chip Tolentino, played by Stephen Mark, hits a rough patch when it appears an early spurt of puberty strikes. He notices a pretty girl in the audience just as he is expected to take his place center stage and spell.

There is home-schooled Leaf Coneybear, played by Lee Slobotkin, wearing a mismatched outfit that includes a cape, who is always being told by his pack of siblings that he is the dumbest of the bunch.

Marcy Park, played by Emily Borromeo, attends the Catholic school Our Lady of Intermittent Sorrows, and is driven to be an overachiever by her parents. In her solo, "I Speak Six Languages," she reels off an impressive list of accomplishments before acknowledging she is also tired of always winning.

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The last contest is also the youngest, Logainne SchwartzandGrubenierre, played by Heslens Estevez. Logainne's cumbersome surname is a combination of her two dads'. Being the only kid at her school with two fathers also ensures that lisping Logainne is also very politically astute.

Lindsie VanWinkle plays a former spelling champion and the current emcee Rona Lisa Peretti, Matt Welsh is vice principal Douglas Panch and Billy Lowrimore takes on the part of the ex-con, comfort counselor Mitch Mahoney, who hands out juice boxes to contestants as they are eliminated.

VanWinkle describes the show as the "trials and tribulations" of these young contestants as they navigate "a stressful situation."

"It's hilarious, heartwarming and heartbreaking at some times," VanWinkle said. "We forget that the anxiety that we go through as children are still the same quirks we have as adults."

Although the cast is comprised of adults portraying kids, Slobotkin, who plays Leaf, believes the cast is playing each character truthfully and not just for comedy's sake.

"We look forward to working through this process over the coming months to determine whether the site is suitable for community gardening," a Parks spokeswoman said.

Some ideas being considered for the garden include a solar-powered rainwater harvesting system and a bicycle-powered compost trommel to appeal to kids.

West said the idea to start the garden came from her husband's stories about his days working on Rikers Island and the positive effect of the garden on inmates there as well as her desire to get her daughter to eat healthy, organic food. "I've done some volunteering in the past but nothing really specifically related to gardening," she said. "I support my family. I try to get my neighbors to eat as clean and healthy as they can."

West said they are currently setting up a meeting with CB 7's Parks Committee to discuss the proposal.

Nearly 40 people in the family's community have signed a petition in favor of the garden.

The Queens School of Inquiry, at 158-40 76th Road, which West's daughter attends, sent a letter of support to GreenThumb for the project, and along with the Hydroponic Garden Center at 146-47 Horace Harding Expressway, agreed to sponsor the garden.

West is also in contact with another horticultural therapist who wants to offer work-

shop classes at the garden.

Paula Segal, founder of 596 Acres, which catalogs vacant lots that could be turned into community resources, donated the signs for the lot.

"We kind of oversee it for now until we get more people solidly signed on, but the idea is to have a community involvement, a large community involvement," she said.

People became interested in getting involved with the garden when they realized they could contribute in a variety of ways.

"When I break it down to people like that, people get excited," she said.

Services has nine locations in Queens, Brooklyn and Manhattan. It offers a wide variety of services that go beyond the needs of just the elderly, such as mental health, community and immigration assistance.

The Korean population of Bayside hardly compares to that of Flushing where the majority of the organization's work is centered, but KCS plans to offer a facility for the entire community. Kim believes that the majority of people who will use the facility will have the ability to reach them by bus, making any residual traffic concerns obsolete.

City Councilman Paul Vallone (D-Bayside) was part of the discussion at the time that the SCA was considering buying the property. Vallone told the TimesLedger he believes that whatever happens with the property, it should be done with the involvement of the community.

"I know when we worked with Mr. Kim and Linda Lee, their executive directors, the best advice we could give them was to include the community and get their thoughts, and I'm proud of them for doing that," Vallone said. "They've stated from the beginning it's going to be open to everybody."

He added that the transaction between the Bayside Jewish Center and the KCS is a private purchase,a deal the City Council has no ability to get involved in.

In November, Bayside residents turned out in force for a Community Board 11 meeting to voice their objection to the school proposal. Only three out of 30 speakers were in favor of the project.

State Sen.Tony Avella (D-Bayside) was one of the most forceful speakers at the heated meeting and pulled no punches against those not doing their part to block the project. The CB 11 board voted unanimously against the school site.

Continued from Page 1 when homeowners and developers come into our neighborhoods and deceitfully try to circumvent building codes. This type of blatant disregard of building permit requirements and deliberate overdevelopment will never be accepted in our community," Vallone told the TimesLedger. "I want to thank the DOB for working hand-in-hand with our office to immediately address this issue."

The large, stately house located on 218-15 40th Ave. is believed to have been built circa 1890 and was the one of

the personal residences of the Lawrence family, influential members of the early Bayside community. A study conducted by historic preservation consultant Paul Graziano found the Lawrence Estate is eligible for the National and State Register of Historic Places, a recognition that carries no protection from demolition or alteration.

The building plans for the renovation show that only the front of the house was to be build upon. But neighbors watched in despair as the roof was peeled away and the inside gutted, according to Kiladitis, who grew up in the Skala house across the street.

Vallone is pushing for the

Department of Buildings to levy the maximum fines and penalties in order to set an example to homeowners, contractors and architects. According to a spokesman for Vallone, a quick response from the DOB is critical to ensure that houses are not torn down and rebuilt before action can be taken.

State Assemblyman Edward Braunstein (D-Bayside) also put in a complaint with the Department of Buildings.

Continued from Page 5 were reported to have opened late or not at all, according to Stringer, and one site in Queens had its machines break down.

"Meanwhile, a voter in southeast Queens reported broken machines at his poll site at the start of the day, leading poll workers to instruct voters 'to place their ballot in a slot, and they would all get processed later," Stringer said. He asked Ryan to explain how these road blocks would be overcome in the June and September primaries as well as the November general election.

In "Barriers to the Ballot," Stringer said modern technology such as text and e-mail must be included in the communications strategy to get voters to the right place at the right time. Leading up to Primary Day, some 60,000 voters received letters that erroneously informed them that the election would be held in September and were later informed in a separate letter that it would be held April 12.

Primary Day also had reports of workers who did not know how to operate the "optimum scan" voting machines, according to Stringer's letter. In addition, some poll workers delivered conflicting information and told voters that an affidavit ballot would not count towards the election.

The purged voter rolls in Brooklyn were mentioned last in the letter as well as the lawsuit already filed known as Campanello et al v. state Board of Elections, asking for the barred voters' rights to be restored immediately.

"These errors have conspired to bar first time and longtime voters from exercising their fundamental democratic right," Stringer said. "Indeed, voter enrollment data show that the number of eligible Democratic voters in Brooklyn precipitously dropped by more than 120,000 voters between November 2015 and April 2016, without any adequate explanation furnished by the Board of Elections."

Stringer's "Barriers to the Ballot" report proposes adoption of same-day registration, which would allow voters to register on the same day as elections.

"There is nothing more sacred in our nation than the right to vote, yet election after election, reports come in of people who were inexplicably purged from the polls, told to vote at the wrong location or unable to get in to their polling site," Stringer said about the audit his office will conduct.

"The people of New York City have lost confidence that the Board of Elections can effectively administer elections and we intend to find out why the BOE is so consistently disorganized, chaotic and inefficient," he said. "With four elections in New York City in 2016 alone, we don't have a moment to spare."

General election turnout for Queens was recorded at 24 percent in 2014, indicating a downward spiral from previous years.

Continued from Page 9 winning screenwriter Josh Singer and survivor Phillip Saviano, a key figure in unmasking the Boston scandal, and actor Neal Huff, who portrays Saviano in the film.

The second roundtable will be followed by a screening of the film itself for survivors and legislators at a restaurant inside the Capitol complex. Markey's request to present the film in a legislative hearing room was denied by Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie (D-Bronx).

"Our current statute of limitations protects the wrong people," Markey said. "It gives a free pass to predators and those who hide them, but most often denies justice to their victims. It victimizes both victims and all of society. Reforming these statutes will help expose predators who remain hidden and continue to abuse new generations of children."

Queens District Attorney Richard Brown said last week his office has long been supportive of extending the criminal statute of limitations for young victims of sexual abuse.

"But he was not specifically talking about any particular bill and, at this time, he is not prepared to go beyond his original statement," DA spokesman Kevin Ryan said.

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
